"Jake's Takes"

Hello All—Summer is in full swing now I hope all are enjoying our Ohio weather. I will begin this article by mentioning three of our local businesses that allow us the opportunity to display our newsletters in

their places of business—the Once Around Shop on Cherry Street, Your Flower Shop at the corner of Cherry and Main Streets, and Wilson Hardware on main Street. Now I would like to mention a program of import to military veterans. It is a preventative dental program, this

program has been described in the Register Herald this dental assistance is provided by the Preble County Veterans

Services Commission with the cooperation of local dentists. It includes basic annual examination and cleaning and can include x-rays if deemed necessary and other dental processes. To find out more about the service contact Director Keith Carr at Preble County

Veterans Services or his assistants— Sarah or Tina. Remember Veterans Services can help you navigate through the VA's benefits claims process. If you

are the spouse of a deceased veteran these folks may be able to address your concerns. Moving on this past February 5

of us (Charlie Brown, Marvin Shelby, Junior James, Phil Newport, and myself)

from our group adventured to Buffalo Jack's restaurant in Covington, about 39 miles from Eaton. There is a buffalo and an Indian with full headdress in front of the building and the place has a red door, boy did we pick a beautiful February day, temperature above 70 full sun all day. If you are not familiar with Buffalo Jack's they feature a wild game menu: alligator, antelope, elf (chops), buffalo (steaks & burgers), three and four game sausages

prepared on onion grass and great walleye. Inside the restaurant with some interesting figurines, Indian and animal and a very large polar bear that had been expertly prepared by a taxidermist. These displays were positioned along our way to the banquet room. For our lunch they did seat us in the banquet room which has a Plains Indian motif and a very interesting American Indiana welcoming committee at the entrance to this banquet room. For lunch Marvin Shelby had the walleye sandwich platter, Junior James opted for a combo plate, alligator and wild boar, Phil

Newport, Charlie Brown and myself ordered buffalo burger platters. The food was good and the service was good. (see

photos). Moving on, I enjoy reading articles by Jim McGuire, guest columnist at the Register Herald. In his April 8th article he discussed gathering and fixin' dandelion greens and the incredible health benefits eating them provide. His article bought back memories from my preteen years. We lived in Dayton on Brown

Street (South Park Neighborhood) a couple blocks from the old Montgomery County fairgrounds (Main and Wyoming Streets). Mom was born a country girl, one of seven children (Ross County— Chillicothe) back to the dandelion greens. Mom would gix dandelion greens often, regularly as a matter of fact. We would collect those dandelion greens at the fairgrounds, my brother and I would grab a couple of grocery bags a piece, throw them in our radio flyer wagon, following

mom pulling our wagon to the fairgrounds there. Mom would dig up the dandelions and my brother and I would put those leaves and roots in the bags, when the bags were full, we pulled our wagon home and mom took over from there; and we had a mess of greens to eat that evening (I think I liked them, not sure

about my brother though). This past March29th the Preble County library sponsored a Vietnam program that coincided with the Nationally recognized Vietnam War Veteran Day. The program included photo slides of Vietnam. The main speaker was Dr. Hardy, the Chief of Staff at the Dayton VA Hospital and

himself a Vietnam War Veteran. The program was open to the public and there were numerous veterans in attendance also, five from our senior center group– Phil Newport (Army), Charlie Brown (Army), Junior Games (Army), Dan

Monnin (Air Force), and myself (USMC). Dr. Hardy's presentation included

personal stories and experiences, it was humorous and thought-provoking as well. The informal gathering with the veterans and others after the presentation was an unplanned bonus and greatly enjoyed by all. Dr. Hardy handed out Vietnam lapel pins to those who had not received them before. (See photos). We send a thank you and a well done to Angie Getter Preble County room manager and Bill Wing able assistant and all the library staff. Moving on, I would like to thank Carol employee at CVS—being the old timer and the

dinosaur that I am, I always have difficulty using the self checkout, Carol

bails me out, THANK YOU Carol. Did you know? The last Roman Gladiator competition was in 404 A.D., now you know.



Home Delivered Meals

We deliver hot nutritious meals to older adults at home. Meal deliverers check on the welfare of the client and are trained to report any health or other problems noticed during visit. Call for eligibility.

Homemaking Services

For an individual or couple who live alone, are more frail, and have acute or chronic conditions. Services provide light housekeeping, laundry, grocery shopping, pharmacy or bank errands, and light meal preparation.

Transportation

Must be 60 years of age or older and live in Preble County. Wheelchair transportation is available, and one escort may ride with each participant. We transport within a 50 mile radius of Preble County.

Service Navigation, Information & Referral

Provides in-depth, on-going information, referral, and case management options. Connecting seniors and their families with needed services, resources, and/or programs.

The Ohio Department of Development and the Preble County Council on Aging want to remind senior citizens in Ohio that assistance is available to help with their home energy bills. The Home Energy Assistance Program (HEAP) helps Ohioans at or below 175 percent of the federal poverty guidelines pay their heating bills. Applied directly to the customer's utility or bulk fuel bill, the benefit can help manage heating costs. Senior citizens may go to their local Area Agency on Aging office for help with assembling the required documents and completing their HEAP application. Senior citizens may also visit www.energyhelp.ohio.gov to apply online or to download a copy of the application. When applying, individuals need to have copies of the following documents: Most recent utility bills, A list of all household members (including birth dates and Social Security numbers), Proof of income for the past 30 days for all household members (12 months for certain income types), Proof of U.S. citizenship or legal residency for all household members, Proof of disability (if applicable)

HEAP benefits are applied to an individual's energy bill after January 1st.

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
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
