"Jake's Takes"

Hello All – Hope everyone is ready for spring's early flowers and summer's warm days. Thought I'd start this article by mentioning some of the recognized and some of the not so recognized days of the months of May and June. Here we go: May 1 National Law Day – to celebrate rule of law, May 6 International Nurses Day, May 14 Mother's Day – get mama a gift or take her out for a meal, May 22 National Maritime Day, May 29 Memorial Day – to honor and remember keeping her free, June 14 US Army established 1775, it is also Flag Day, June 18 Father's Day (poem later), June 22 Pledge of Allegiance recognized by Congress in 1942, June 24 Armed Forces Day, and June 27 National Post Traumatic Stress Awareness Day. Time for did you Know... What were Beecher's Bibles? Answer later. In my reading and research for this page, I ran across an article that intrigued me and I thought it might interest you also. It is entitled "Emotion Keys Moral Thinking". Here's the dilemma: a runaway train will kill five people unless you flip a switch sending it onto another track where it will kill only one. Most people say flipping the switch is moral. But what if the only way to stop the train is to push a passer-by onto the track? You still save a net of four lives, but most people say that's not moral. Why people have such different reactions to the same end has long puzzled philosophers. Now Princeton University researchers have scanned volunteers' brains while they pondered similar ethical dilemmas – and found that a key to tough moral judgements is emotions, not logical or analytical reasoning. The study doesn't say what's a right or wrong decision. But for the first time, images of which brain areas are activated – as they literally light up in scans – showing how people make individual moral judgements. Answer to Beecher's Bibles were actually breech loading sharps rifles. Now the rest of the story, it seems a Brooklyn clergyman the Rev. Henry Ward Beecher whose antislavery combatants in the Kansas Nebraska Territory during the bleeding Kansas period 1854 to 1860. These rifles

were in shipping crates marked Bibles, hence the reference Beecher's Bibles, now you know. Since Father's Day is in the month of June. I found a poem I would like to present in this article, it's titled: Daddy's Poem. Her hair was up in a pony tail, her favorite dress tied with a bow. Today was Daddy's Day at school, and she couldn't wait to go. But her mommy tried to tell her, that she probably should stay home. Why the kids might not understand, if she went to school alone. But she was not afraid; she knew just what to say. What to tell her classmates of why he wasn't there today. But still her mother worried, for her to face this day alone. And that was why once again, she tried to keep her daughter home. But the little girl went to school eager to tell them all. About a dad she never sees a dad who never calls. There were daddies along the wall in back, for everyone to meet. Children squirming impatiently, anxious in their seats. One by one the teacher called a student from the class. To introduce their daddy, as the seconds slowly passed. At last the teacher called her name, every child turned to stare. Each of them was searching, a man who wasn't there. "Where's her daddy at?" she heard a boy call out. "She probably doesn't have one," another student dared to shout. And from somewhere near the back, she heard a daddy say, "Looks like another deadbeat dad, too busy to waste his day." The words did not offend her, as she smiled up at her Mom. And looked back at her teacher, who told her to go on. And with hands behind her back, slowly she began to speak. And out from the mouth of a child, came words incredibly unique. "My Daddy couldn't be here, because he lives so far away. But I know he wishes he could be, since this is such a special day. And though you cannot meet him, I wanted you to know. All about my daddy, and how much he loves me so. He loved to tell me stories he taught me to ride my bike. He surprised me with pink roses, and taught me to fly a kite. We used to share fudge sundaes, and ice cream in a cone. And though you cannot see him. I'm not standing here alone. "Cause my daddy's always with me, even though we are apart I know because he

With that, her little hand reached up, and lay across her chest. Feeling her own heartbeat, beneath her favorite dress. And from somewhere here in the crowd of dads, her mother stood in tears. Proudly watching her daughter, who was wise beyond her years. For she stood up for the love of a man not in her life. Doing what was best for her, doing what was right. And when she dropped her hand back down, staring straight into the crowd. She finished with a voice so soft, but its message clear and loud. "I love my daddy very much, he's my shining star. And a child was blessed, if only for a moment, by the love of her shining star. And given the gift of believing, that heaven is never too far. Heating Assistance Available — Application Deadline: May 31, 2023

The Ohio Department of Development and the Preble County Council on Aging want to remind senior citizens in Ohio that assistance is available to help with their home energy bills. The Home Energy Assistance Program (HEAP) helps Ohioans at or below 175 percent of the federal poverty guidelines pay their heating bills. Applied directly to the customer's utility or bulk fuel bill, the benefit can help manage heating costs. Senior citizens may go to their local Area Agency on Aging office for help with assembling the required documents and completing their HEAP application. Senior citizens may also visit www.energyhelp.ohio.gov to apply online or to download a copy of the application. When applying, individuals need to have copies of the following documents: Most recent utility bills, A list of all household members (including birth dates and Social Security numbers), Proof of income for the past 30 days for all household members (12 months for certain income types), Proof of U.S. citizenship or legal residency for all household members, Proof of disability (if applicable)

HEAP benefits are applied to an individual's energy bill after January 1st. Applications for the HEAP program must be received by May 31, 2023. 
